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PREFACE

"Boles Bible Questions" is designed as an aid to systematic study of the word of God. The plan of the book is simple and is easily comprehended with a casual examination; it is not necessary to enlarge upon this thought in this "Preface."

Any book that helps to extend a knowledge of the Bible, or to stimulate an interest in the Bible, or to aid the student in learning the Bible, or to guide the teacher in teaching the Bible has a commendable purpose. The knowledge of God's truth is so important that any book that may lead any one into a fuller knowledge of the word of God has a just claim for its mission.

Questions are the most useful tools in teaching; to question well is one of the highest achievements of a successful teacher. The questions in this book on the Bible are so framed as to guide the student into a correct understanding of the subject and to provoke thought of the highest order. There are two classes of questions: test questions and developing questions. Test questions lead to topical answers and cannot be answered with a "yes" or "no. " In the developing questions the teacher gives hints to aid the pupil in thinking through a correct answer. Both classes of Questions are used in this book. All of the questions are direct, and when answered correctly will enlarge the students' knowledge of the book of God.

The material found in the supplementary pages has been gathered from various sources and has been reworked so as to present it here in a concise way. An effort has been made to bring a great deal of facts, events, and characters within a small compass of space.

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INTRODUCTION

The author's long, varied experience in teaching the Bible and his knowledge of the books that have been prepared to aid the teaching of the Bible have led him to believe that there is a need for such a book as is now offered in this volume. Many students and teachers will be glad to have such a book.

There are various motives which influence people to read or study the Bible. One may be interested in literature and read the Bible because it is a classic production in that field. Another may approach the Bible as an archaeologist or historian; this one will find it as a source book of information concerning the history of the Hebrews and of other ancient peoples. Still another may be interested in the study of the origin of religions from the standpoint of a theory of natural development; the Bible gives the origin of the religion of the Jews and the origin of Christianity. Still another may be interested in the study of the Bible from a legal point of view; his purpose may be to master the Mosaic law and trace the principles of modern law to the Bible as its source. Still others may be interested in ancient languages, and may study the Bible to get information concerning the Aramaic, Hebrew, and Greek; those who are thus interested may find a fruitful field of language study.

All of these motives may be proper if they are held as secondary motives. A primary purpose of studying the Bible should be to learn the will of God to man, and to be guided by that will in all of the affairs of life. We can get along without any exact knowledge of ancient languages or of archeology or history, and even without an appreciation of literature; but we cannot dispense with a knowledge of the way of salvation as revealed in the word of God. The Bible not only teaches us how we may be saved through faith in Christ, but it also teaches us how we ought to live.

There are 104 lessons on the Old Testament and 52 lessons on the New Testament. Each lesson contains 18 definite questions; hence, there are 1872 questions on the

Old Testament and 936 on the New Testament, or 2808 questions on the Bible. These questions touch upon many events, principles, truths, and biographies. There are lessons for two years' study in the Old Testament and one year's study in the New Testament by taking one lesson each week. These lessons have been used in weekly prayer meetings with satisfactory results; hence, the author can commend them to the public.

"Boles Bible Questions" will be found helpful to teachers, students, and leaders of church work; it is prepared for Bible classes, ladies' Bible classes, young peoples' meetings, prayer meetings, and other groups that meet for regular Bible study. It will prove very helpful to churches where the leadership is not efficient, or where class and prayer meeting leaders have not much time at their disposal for preparation.

In addition to the 156 lessons, there have been included many maps of Bible lands, tables, charts, outlines of Bible history, and chronological classification of events; these will prove valuable aids to the Bible student. Very few questions are asked which cannot be answered from the Bible; this book does not call for a library to answer the questions. It is intended to direct thought upon the Bible, and the Bible only may be used in answering these questions.

The chronology is only approximate; time and dates of events can be determined, in many instances, only approximately. The chronologies of Usher, Beecher, and C. H. Turner are used in the tables. Sometimes these authors vary in their calculations; hence, it is well to remember that nearly all chronological tables give only approximate dates.





CHART OF OLD TESTAMENT HISTORY

The chronology of the period of the judges is very uncertain because of the uncertainty of the date of the exodus, and because it is not possible to know how many of them lived at the same time in different parts of the country. It seems, therefore, more helpful to the practical study of this period to give the dates in the margins of our Bibles, with the understanding that they are not authoritative.

Note 2.—From about David's time we have a new help in deciding on the dates for a period of about two hundred and fifty years. This aid is derived from the Assyrian inscriptions which are dated by the Assyrian calendar, or canon, of which several copies have been found. These cover the period from 900 to about 650 B.C. Each year bears the name of an officer called an Eponym, i.e., "named after a person." From the mention of a total eclipse which occurred 763 B.C. all the other dates are determined. These vary about forty years from the dates in the margins of our Bibles at the time of Rehoboam, but the differences grow less till the two series exactly agree at the time of the fall of Samaria. There are still some difficulties about the calculations; but practically the two computations agree.

These facts were ascertained by a gentleman in 1718; also by an English gentleman, at Amsterdam, in 1772; and the investigation is said to have taken each gentleman three years.

The Bible has been translated into 226 different languages.

The Old Testament was divided into chapters, as they now stand, by Cardinal Hugo, in the middle of the thirteenth century. These chapters were divided into verses, as we now have them, by Rabbi Nathan, and adopted by Robert Stephens, a French printer, in his edition of the Vulgate, in 1555, and transferred to the Authorized Version in 1611.

The New Testament was divided into chapters by Hugo de St. Cher about 1240, and into verses by Robert Stephens, and was first so published by him in 1551, and thence these divisions were transferred to the English version, published in Geneva in 1560.




CHART OF NEW TESTAMENT HISTORY

THIS CHART PRESENTS SOME OF THE MAIN EVENTS OF NEW TESTAMENT HISTORY




